Summary Formal consultation has now concluded on the school reorganisation proposal “to increase the capacity of Millbrook Primary School from 210 to 315, therefore creating a permanent 1.5 form entry school from September 2018”.

This formal consultation was carried out between 11th September 2017 and 22nd October 2017. Following conclusion of this process a consultation report, which describes the consultation process and feedback received in some detail, has been drafted and is attached at Appendix 1. The report has also been published on the Newport City Council website and shared with stakeholders as outlined in the statutory School Organisation Code.

This report references those findings, the result of which recommends that the Council moves to publish a statutory proposal. During this statutory proposal period, legal objections can be lodged by any stakeholder, and will need to be considered before any final determination is taken.

Proposal **To move to the publication of a statutory notice for a period of 28 days in respect of the proposal “to increase the capacity of Millbrook Primary School from 210 to 315, therefore creating a permanent 1.5 form entry school from September 2018”.**

Background

A formal consultation on the proposal to increase the capacity of Millbrook Primary School was carried out between 11th September 2017 and 22nd October 2017. Following conclusion of this process a consultation report was prepared, published on the Newport City Council website and shared with stakeholders as outlined in the statutory School Organisation Code.

There is now a requirement to consider the content of this report and determine whether or not it is appropriate to move to the next stage in the school reorganisation process which is the publication of a statutory proposal. During this statutory proposal period, legal objections can be lodged by any stakeholder, and if any are received will need to be considered before any final determination is taken.

A copy of the Consultation Report is attached at Appendix 1 but there now follows a synopsis of the feedback received.

Stakeholder Engagement

An invitation to take part in the statutory consultation was issued to an extensive list of stakeholders, with two separate drop-in events arranged where people directly affected by the proposal could attend to find out more information and share their views. Both of these events were held at the school and were attended by five parents in total who were mainly in support of the proposal but wished to raise two separate concerns. These concerns are outlined within the Consultation Report at Appendix 1 (page 8 of this report).

Learner Voice

Whilst a children's questionnaire was created and shared with Millbrook Primary School for distribution amongst pupils, it was unfortunate that no completed responses were returned to the Council.

However the Education Service Development Manager visited Millbrook Primary School on 17th October 2017 and met with six members of the School Council from across the Year Four, Five and Six groups to discuss the proposal and allow an opportunity for them to share their views. All six of the pupils present thought that the proposal was a good idea. Their specific comments and questions are outlined within the Consultation Report at Appendix A (page 9 of this report).

Consultation Responses

Unfortunately no stakeholder responses were received other than that from Estyn as detailed below.

Estyn

The formal response from Estyn concluded that "the proposal is likely to at least maintain the current standard of education provision in the area".

However the response also stated that:

- the proposal did not include sufficient information to outline how there would be increased opportunities for staff, and
- there was no full explanation as to how the proposed mixed-age classes might impact on the education of the children at the school.

These comments, along with the relevant Local Authority responses, are outlined in full within the Consultation Report at Appendix 1 (page 10 of this report).

Financial Summary

There is no capital funding associated with this proposal, although some maintenance works have already been carried out on the site to improve existing facilities in terms of previously unused classrooms to ensure their suitability and appropriateness for delivery of the national curriculum across all year groups.

The provision of additional school places may affect the current pupil demographics across the City but should not increase the number of pupils within the primary cohort. There may however be savings in terms of home to school transport, as increasing the number of school places available could reduce the number of children who require free transport assistance to their next nearest available school. These savings, if they arise, cannot be quantified at the present time.

Options Available

Option 1: to move to the next stage in this school reorganisation process, which is the publication of a statutory proposal (notice) for a period of 28 days, and is the opportunity at which any legal objections can be lodged against the proposal.

Option 2: to withdraw the proposal following consideration of the feedback received during the formal consultation period and outlined in detail within the attached Consultation Report.

Preferred Option and Why

The preferred option is Option 1. The publication of a statutory notice is the next stage in this school reorganisation proposal. This 28-day period will provide all consultees and stakeholders with an opportunity to further consider, and if necessary lodge legal objections to, the proposal.

Comments of Chief Financial Officer

The report states that the expansion of Millbrook Primary school will not increase overall Primary numbers but will lead to a redistribution of those pupil numbers. No additional funding is available so the Primary sector would have to absorb any financial implications arising from this proposal.

Comments of Monitoring Officer

The proposed action is in accordance with the statutory school reorganisation procedures set out in the School Standards and Organisation (Wales) Act 2013 and the School Organisation Code. The proposal to increase the capacity of Millbrook Primary School from 210 to 315 by creating a permanent 1.5 form entry school is a regulated alteration and, therefore, has to be the subject of formal statutory consultation under the Code. In accordance with the statutory procedures, a detailed consultation document has been prepared, setting out the reasons for the proposals, and there has been meaningful consultation with key stakeholders, including children and young people, who are likely to be affected by the changes. The only consultation response received was from Estyn, who concluded that the proposals would, at least, maintain current standards of education provision in the area, although further information was requested, which is addressed in the attached consultation report. The Cabinet Member is now required to consider these representations and decide whether or not to proceed with the necessary statutory notices, having regard to the educational impact of the proposals.

If the decision is taken to proceed, then the proposal will need to be published by way of formal statutory notice, on the Council's website and by public notices, and a period of 28 days (including, at least, 15 school days) must be allowed for statutory objections. If there are no objections, then the final decision can be taken by the Cabinet Member but if there are any unresolved statutory objections then the final decision will be referred to full Cabinet.

Comments of Head of People and Business Change

As required by the Well-being of Future Generations (Wales) Act 2015 this proposal has considered all five aspects of the sustainable development principle.

In addition a Fairness and Equality Impact Assessments (FEIA) has been completed. This assessment has been updated in light of the responses received in the formal consultation process. This should be reviewed again at each stage of the decision making process.

Finally, there are no human resources implications at this stage of the process other than keeping employees in the school informed.

Local issues

Comment from Bettws ward member, Cllr Kevin Whitehead:

As I've stated previously this move can only be a good thing for Millbrook and Bettws in general as the demand for placements increases in particular due to the granting of further planning applications for social housing out here. Hopefully NCC will also have a look at the estates lack of infrastructure as well in the near future which is struggling to cope with the extra influx of people requiring services.

Equalities Impact Assessment

The Equality Act 2010 contains a Public Sector Equality Duty which came into force on 06 April 2011. The Act identifies a number of 'protected characteristics', namely age; disability; gender reassignment; pregnancy and maternity; race; religion or belief; sex; sexual orientation; marriage and civil partnership. The new single duty aims to integrate consideration of equality and good relations into the regular business of public authorities. In summary this proposal supports wellbeing by increasing the availability of school places in an area of high demand, supporting the principles of parental preference and local schools for local pupils. Attendance and punctuality are likely to be positively affected where children are able to attend a local school of their choice. In turn, high school attendance rates is a significant factor in attainment and this therefore impacts on educational outcomes and on longer term employment opportunities.

Crime and Disorder Act 1998

Section 17(1) of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 imposes a duty on the Local Authority to exercise its various functions with due regard to the likely effect of the exercise of those functions on, and the need to do all that it reasonably can to prevent, crime and disorder in its area.

The Proposal

To increase the capacity of Millbrook Primary School from 210 to 315, therefore creating a permanent 1.5 form entry school from September 2018.

Stakeholder Engagement

An invitation to take part in the statutory consultation was issued to the following stakeholders, with either a link to the consultation pack on the Council's website and an electronic version of the pack sent by e-mail or alternatively by hard copies of the consultation material being issued:

- Teachers, staff and the governing body of Millbrook Primary School;
- Parents, carers and guardians of pupils attending Millbrook Primary School;
- Pupils at Millbrook Primary School;
- The Headteachers and Governing Bodies of all local primary schools and those schools within the Newport High School cluster, ie., Newport High School, Kimberley Nursery School, Crindau Primary School, Malpas Church in Wales Infant School, Malpas Church in Wales Junior School, Malpas Court Primary School, Malpas Park Primary School, Monnow Primary School, Ysgol Gymraeg Bro Teyrnnon and Ysgol Gymraeg Ifor Hael;
- All Newport City Council elected members;
- The Welsh Ministers;
- Assembly Members (AMs) and Members of Parliament (MPs) representing the area served by the schools subject to the proposals;
- Other Local Authorities across the South East Wales Consortium region, including relevant Transport departments;
- The South East Wales Education Achievement Service;
- The Church in Wales, Diocese of Monmouth;
- Roman Catholic Archdiocese;
- Estyn;
- Teaching and staff trade unions representing teachers and staff at Millbrook Infant School and Millbrook Junior School;

The following consultation events were arranged and were publicised via a letter to stakeholders. This information was also shared on the Council website and outlined throughout the consultation document.

Two drop-in events were held at Millbrook Primary School and were attended by five parents in total who were mainly in support of the proposal but wished to raise two separate concerns.

At the first event, an issue was raised in relation to the additional traffic that could potentially arise if the pupil numbers were increased beyond those currently on roll, and the resultant parking issues around properties in close proximity to the school. The majority of pupils attending Millbrook Primary School live within walking distance of the school, and whilst walking to and from school is encouraged, it is inevitable that some parents will use vehicles to transport their children even if not on a regular basis.

The increase in pupil numbers is not considered to have any significant impact on this, as it is anticipated that the pupil demographic will continue to come from the Bettws estate and will therefore be within walking distance of the school. Notwithstanding this however, the school does benefit from a large on-

site visitor car park which parents are able to use at the start and end of the school day. Parents are reminded of this in monthly newsletters from the Headteacher.

At the second event, one parent raised concerns over the effect mixed-age classes might have on pupils, Whilst this was noted within the consultation document as being a disadvantage of the proposal, mixed-age classes are currently operated successfully across a number of Newport schools, the majority of which have been categorised as either “Green” or “Yellow” schools. The proposal to move to 1.5 form entry means that the school would increase from the current 7 class arrangement to an 11 class arrangement. Traditionally where this model is employed, schools operate two small Reception classes, with mixed-age arrangements starting in Year 1 / Year 2. This ensures that the very youngest pupils are given appropriate support when first starting mainstream school.

Everyday Summary Version – Children & Young People

An Everyday Summary Version of the main consultation document was published and shared with stakeholders. This document was also targeted at children and young people.

In addition a children’s questionnaire was created and shared with Millbrook Primary School for distribution amongst pupils. A copy of the questionnaire is shown at Appendix A, although it is unfortunate that no completed responses were returned to the Council.

Learner Voice

The Education Service Development Manager visited Millbrook Primary School on 17th October 2017 and met with six members of the School Council from across the Year Four, Five and Six groups to discuss the proposal and allow an opportunity for them to share their views.

As a group, they made the following comments:

- Having more pupils in the school will be good as children will make more friends and will be given the opportunity to represent the school at more events;
- Mixed-age classes will allow pupils to make friends more easily with children in different year groups;
- Increasing the school incrementally from Reception upwards is a good idea.

They also raised two questions as follows, the responses to which are also outlined below:

- ***Why can’t the second wing in the junior building also be used as classroom space to make the school even bigger?***

The area on the first floor is currently used for Flying Start and this provision cannot be accommodated elsewhere. In addition, the current and projected demand for additional primary school places in the area is not significant enough at present to require an increase to a 2-form entry arrangement. The nearest alternative primary school, Monnow Primary School, is currently a 2-form entry school.

- ***Will children in mixed age classes have to do harder or easier work than children in straight-age classes?***

No, pupils will be taught the curriculum relevant to their age group. This might be achieved by arranging pupils into groups for certain parts of the school day.

All 6 of the pupils present thought that the proposal was a good idea.

Consultation Responses

Unfortunately no stakeholder responses were received other than that from Estyn as detailed below.

Estyn

The formal response from Estyn concluded that “the proposal is likely to at least maintain the current standard of education provision in the area.”

However, whilst acknowledging the view that the proposal will provide increased opportunities for staff, Estyn commented that there is no information to state how this will be carried out. The Headteacher has outlined however that the increased capacity and growth of the school will provide greater opportunity for existing staff to develop professionally. Staff teams will work together to cater for the growing school. This includes enhanced planning and whole school learning opportunities. In addition staff will be encouraged to work across the school sharing expertise in Foundation Phase and Key Stage 2 practice. Currently two staff members are undertaking additional training and assessment to attain Higher Level Teaching Assistant (HLTA) and Qualified Teacher Status (QTS).

In addition, the response felt that there was no full explanation as to how the proposed mixed-age classes might impact on the education of the children. The Headteacher has confirmed however that as the larger published admission number moves through the school, it will be necessary to organise some classes into mixed age groups. The school already has experience of working in this way as most classes were mixed age groups when the primary school originally opened. This experience has proven that a mixed age class organisation does not hinder a child’s progress as teachers will ensure that work is appropriately planned to meet the needs of every child.

A formal consultation document has been drafted. A formal consultation process will be carried out in accordance with the School Standards and Organisation (Wales) Act 2013, and the statutory School Organisation Code 2013.

The results of this consultation are outlined in the Consultation Report which has been prepared and published on the Council website.

6. How will the relevant groups be advised of the changes and the F&EIA?

Stakeholders have been made aware of the publication of the Consultation Report and that this will form part of the decision as to whether or not to move to the publication of the statutory proposal. Copies of the statutory notice will be shared with stakeholders and also published on the Newport City Council website and at the school gates.


