Subject Ysgol Gyfun Gwent Is Coed, Newport

Purpose To seek approval to move to the Statutory Notice stage on the proposal **“to establish a seedling Welsh-medium secondary school, sharing the site of Ysgol Gymraeg Bro Teyrnnon on a temporary basis from September 2016 and subsequent transfer to the original site on Duffryn Way, Newport as soon as possible, or to a permanent location yet to be determined, at the earliest available opportunity”**.

Reason For Urgency

Following the formal consultation which has been carried out for this proposal from the 1st March to the 12th April 2016, it is now necessary to proceed to the publication of a Statutory Notice for 28 calendar days, before taking the final determination on the proposal, which must be taken before the 27th May to support the recruitment of staff to open the school in September 2016. The reason for the urgency is the short turnaround required to establish a new school in time for September 2016.

Summary Following the formal consultation has been carried out for this proposal from the 1st March to the 12th April 2016. A consultation report which describes the findings in more detail will be published on the Council web site. This report references those findings and makes a recommendation to move to the publication of a statutory notice in respect of this proposal. During that statutory notice period legal objections can be set by any consultee, which would need to be considered before any final determination is taken.

Proposal **To move to the statutory notice stage of the statutory consultation on the proposal “to establish a seedling Welsh-medium secondary school, sharing the site of Ysgol Gymraeg Bro Teyrnnon on a temporary basis from September 2016 and subsequent transfer to the original site on Duffryn Way, Newport as soon as possible, or to a permanent location yet to be determined, at the earliest available opportunity”.**

To take this decision urgently as it is so urgent that it cannot go through the Council’s agreed consultation process and/or must be implemented immediately and therefore not subject to the Council’s call in procedures for the reasons set out under ‘Reasons for Urgency’ above.

Background

Following a formal consultation period from the 1st March to the 12th April 2016, it is now appropriate to publish a consultation report on the findings and after full consideration of the findings to take a decision whether or not to move to the next stage of the statutory consultation process which is to publish a statutory notice.

There is a need to prepare for the September 2016 planned opening, the school already has a temporary Governing Body, which has appointed a Headteacher elect. The authority has now received in excess of 80 admission applications and plans are in progress for all school day arrangements including curriculum setting and recruitment of staffing. More recently, the school received approval by the Chief Education Officer, for the name of Ysgol Gyfun Gwent Is Coed. A final determination cannot be taken on the establishment of this school until the publication of a statutory notice and consideration of any legal objections.

Formal Consultation Findings

Various methods of consultation were taken forward:

- the issue of the consultation pack in English and Welsh,
- the issue of an Everyday Summary Version – Children & Young People in English and Welsh
- supported by a pupil questionnaire in English and Welsh – a survey of the Learner's Voice
- drop in sessions
- development of a Frequently Asked Questions page on the web site to support the proposal

Overall the responses were positive, that is to say supporting the proposal.

Recommendation following Formal Consultation and Next Stage

The overall response following Formal Consultation is positive and generally consultees are supportive of the proposal to continue.

The publication of the statutory notice is the next stage in the statutory consultation process, this allows for a period of 28 days during which all consultees are given the opportunity to set legal objections.

Updated timeline and process for the statutory consultation

In the event that the Cabinet Member for Education & Young People takes the urgent decision today to move to publication of the statutory notice on the said proposal, the arrangements are as follows:

- **26th April 2016 to 23rd May 2016** – Publication of the Statutory Notice
- The final decision is to be taken during late May 2016

Options Considered/Available

Option 1: to note the findings of the consultation are generally positive and to move to the publication of the statutory notice

Option 2: to note the findings of the consultation which whilst generally positive also include some negative comments and for that reason not to move to the publication of the statutory notice

Preferred choice and reasons

Option 1 is recommended as the period of 28 days for the publication of the statutory notice gives all consultees time to set legal objections against the proposal.

Comments of Monitoring Officer

The proposed action is in accordance with the statutory school reorganisation procedures set out in the School Standards and Organisation (Wales) Act 2013 and the School Organisation Code. The proposal to establish a seedling Welsh Medium secondary school at Ysgol Gymraig Bro Teyrnnon on a temporary

basis pending the establishment of a permanent site has been formally published and subjected to formal consultation in accordance with the statutory procedure. The proposed school is required to meet the need for Welsh medium education in Newport. In accordance with the statutory procedures, a detailed consultation document has been prepared, setting out the reasons for the proposals, and there has been meaningful consultation with key stakeholders, including children and young people, who are likely to be affected by the changes. The consultation responses are attached to the Report and are largely supportive of the proposal.

At this stage, any decision to proceed with the statutory notices should be based on educational grounds and any staffing implications would have to be considered later

The Cabinet Member is now required to consider these representations and decide whether or not to proceed with the necessary statutory notices. If the decision is taken to proceed, then the proposal will need to be published by way of formal statutory notice, on the Council's website and by public notices, and a period of 28 days (including, at least, 15 school days) must be allowed for statutory objections. If there are no objections, then the final decision can be taken by the Cabinet Member but if there are any unresolved statutory objections then the final decision will be referred to full Cabinet. Because of the statutory timescales and the need to establish the interim arrangements by September 2016, the decision can be taken under the urgent procedures, without consultation or call-in but the reasons for the urgency will need to be reported to Audit Committee in due course.

Comments of Chief Financial Officer

There are no actual financial implications associated with the movement to statutory notice for this school. As the report states, a governing body, head teacher and admissions are all in place for the original commencement of the seedling school from 1st September 2016.

The seedling school is anticipated to grow each year with additional pupils of 90, 120, 120, 150 and 150 in subsequent years from 1st September 2017. The financial consequences associated with the growth of the school will be factored into the Council's medium term revenue plan, along with other associated school growth in line with the Councils School Organisation Plan.

Comments of Head of People and Business Change

Should the proposal not be approved there are potential HR implications for the Headteacher elect who has had their appointment confirmed and has commenced in post. There are no other HR implications arising from this proposal.

The Proposal

To establish a seedling Welsh-medium secondary school, sharing the site of Ysgol Gymraeg Bro Teyrnnon on a temporary basis from September 2016 and subsequent transfer to the original site on Duffryn Way, Newport as soon as possible, or to a permanent location yet to be determined, at the earliest available opportunity.

Everyday Summary Version – Children & Young People

An Everyday Summary Version of the main consultation document was published and this is also targeted at children and young people.

In addition a Survey of the Learner's Voice was carried out by a children's questionnaire created and shared with the school, the children held discussion groups to assist the completion of the questionnaires. The results of these exercises are summarised in the section Survey of the Learner's Voice.

Consultation Responses

108 Consultation responses were received

- 8 respondents submitted comments or questions

The remaining 100 (87 of which were from children) provided the following responses:

- 82 respondents support the proposal (82%)
- 14 respondents did not know (14%)
- 4 respondents do not support the proposal (4%)

Estyn

The formal response by Estyn is positive:

- "It is Estyn's opinion that the proposal is likely to meet the demand for Welsh-medium education in the short term and that it is important that the proposer secures a permanent site for the new Welsh-medium school as soon as possible".

Survey of the Learner's Voice

Frequently Asked Questions received about the proposal have been published on the Council web site and are included for information below:

Proposal under Formal Consultation to establish the New Welsh-medium Secondary School – Frequently Asked Questions

Parents are concerned at having to make a decision on whether or not to accept the place offered to their child at Ysgol Gyfun Gwent Is Coed by 15th March. Can this date be extended?

Yes. This date is automatically populated on letters produced by the Education Management System. Given the specific issues and parental concerns surrounding the new school, this deadline date has been extended to 15th April 2016.

The consultation document refers to 90 pupils in the first year sharing two classrooms and temporary additional provisions. What are these temporary provisions?

Information regarding the accommodation arrangements for September 2016 will be shared once the Governing Body of Ysgol Gymraeg Bro Teyrnnon has received the latest plans from the Council. This meeting is scheduled for Monday 21st March 2016. Following this, information will be shared at a meeting specifically for the parents of current Year 6 pupils, due to take place on Thursday 24th March 2016, and will subsequently be made available on the Ysgol Gyfun Gwent Is Coed website.

How many teachers will be available on a daily basis to teach and care for the children?

This is a matter for the Headteacher and the temporary Governing Body, but it is anticipated that the teaching staff number will be between 6 and 8 in the first year. A Year 6 Parents Meeting has been arranged to take place at 6pm on Thursday 24th March 2016 at Ysgol Gymraeg Bro Teyrnnon and more information will be shared at this time.

My child is currently receiving extra support. How will this continue if necessary in the new secondary school?

The Headteacher and her appointed staff will ensure that the needs of all pupils attending this new school are fully met.

My child has a medical condition that needs to be monitored and cared for, how will this be managed on a daily basis?

The Headteacher will make suitable arrangements to ensure that the health, safety and wellbeing of all pupils is not compromised in any way.

Is it correct that parents who choose to send their children to Ysgol Gyfun Gwynllyw will be required to pay for transport?

The Council's Home to School Transport policy regarding secondary school pupils only applies to children living three miles or more from their catchment school. Parents can elect for their children to attend an alternative school, but if this application is successful, they will not be eligible for assistance with transport costs. If the current proposal is successful, Ysgol Gyfun Gwent Is Coed will be the catchment school for all pupils entering Year 7 in September 2016 and therefore the Council will not provide free school transport to any other Welsh-medium secondary school.

How is transport eligibility assessed?

In determining eligibility, distances are measured by the shortest available walking route between the nearest entrance / front gate of the home and the nearest entrance / gate of the school. The Council will determine this shortest available walking route using specific routing software, and this may not necessarily be the route chosen by the child. The measurement tool has been approved by both the Head of Streetscene and Scrutiny Committee, and for fairness is the only measurement tool that is used by the council.

In assessing a route, the Council will deem it as "available" if a child, accompanied as necessary, can walk to school in reasonable safety. It is for parents and not the Council to determine whether or not a child needs accompanying. In assessing the availability of a route, the Council follows WG guidelines and will take account of risks and other relevant safety factors, and the assessments take place at the time of day and on the days of the week that pupils would be expected to use the route.

How will the Ysgol Gymraeg Bro Teyrnion site cope with the additional traffic?

The development of the site will include additional parking facilities for staff at the new school. School buses will use the turning circle at the bottom of the Brynglas estate to drop-off and collect secondary age pupils, and parents will be encouraged to do the same.

In addition, the temporary Governing Body will also create a School Travel Plan to support access to the school.

How can objections be made to this proposal?

Following this consultation, the Cabinet Member for Education & Young People will consider the views expressed and decide whether or not to proceed with the proposal. If the decision is taken to proceed, a statutory notice will be published in the local press, on the Council website and at the school. The statutory notice period will last for 1 month and enables people to express their views in the form of supporting or objecting to the proposal.

What will the uniform be at the new school?

This is a matter for the Headteacher to decide in conjunction with the temporary Governing Body and they will let you know immediately that this is agreed. A Year 6 Parents Meeting has been arranged to take place at 6pm on Thursday 24th March 2016 at Ysgol Gymraeg Bro Teyrnion and more information will be shared at this time.

What will be the start and end times of the school day at the new school?

This is a matter for the Headteacher to decide in conjunction with the temporary Governing Body and they will let you know immediately that this is agreed. A Year 6 Parents Meeting has been arranged to take place at 6pm on Thursday 24th March 2016 at Ysgol Gymraeg Bro Teyrnnon and more information will be shared at this time.

What arrangements have been made for delivery of the curriculum at the new school?

This is a matter for the Headteacher to decide in conjunction with the temporary Governing Body and they will let you know immediately that this is agreed. However the new school will be capable of delivering all aspects of the curriculum, although some PE lessons will be delivered at Newport High School. A Year 6 Parents Meeting has been arranged to take place at 6pm on Thursday 24th March 2016 at Ysgol Gymraeg Bro Teyrnnon and more information will be shared at this time.

Will the pupils at the new secondary be able to access a cafeteria lunchtime facility?

Discussions are currently on-going with the Catering provider but every effort will be made to ensure that the secondary school pupils are able to access a lunchtime cafeteria facility similar to their peers in other secondary schools across the City.

Will there be after school clubs at the new school?

Yes, the school will set up after school clubs, and the Headteacher will decide on these arrangements with her staff as we approach the start of the academic year.
