COUNTDOWN TO CHRISTMAS

Newport will start the countdown to Christmas with a spectacular event packed with fun for all the family on Saturday, November 18.

Running from 3pm to 5.15pm in the city centre, it will feature live music, fairground rides and celebrity guests with the main stage based at the junction of Charles Street and Commercial Street.

The event will culminate with the official switching on of the Christmas lights and a breathtaking fireworks display.

Organised by the Newport Now Business Improvement District (BID) in partnership with Newport City Council, Friars Walk and Newport City Radio, Countdown to Christmas will mirror the BID's hugely successful previous events.

Last year's event attracted more than 7,000 additional people into the city centre compared with an average Saturday.

Councillor Jane Mudd, leader of Newport City Council, said: "Countdown to Christmas is always a very special occasion for the city and attracts thousands of people to the city centre.

"We are very grateful to our partners, especially the Newport Now Business Improvement District, for organising such a fantastic, feel-good event. It's the perfect start to the festive season."

Musical acts will be on stage during the day, and a special guest will be helping the city's mayor, Councillor Trevor Watkins, push the button to light up the city centre for the festive season.

There will be fairground rides along the riverfront and the Christmas lights switch-on is due to take place at 5pm followed by the fireworks display at 5.15pm.

REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY PARADE

Newport's annual Remembrance parade and service will take place on Sunday 12 November in the city centre.

Those invited to take part in the parade will include standard bearers, ex-servicemen, members of the Royal British Legion, Armed Forces, associations, councillors, representatives from emergency services and youth groups.



Residents are advised that there will be road closures in place from 7am - Ipm. The roads affected will be; Upper Dock Street (from Skinner Street to Old Green roundabout), Old Green roundabout (including slip roads), Town Bridge, Clarence Place, Caerleon Road (from Clarence Place to Church Road), Chepstow

Road (from Clarence Place to Cedar Road), Corporation Road (from Clarence Place to St. Vincent Road) and East Usk Road (from Clarence Place to Tregare Street).

On Saturday 18 November the Merchant Navy Remembrance service will take place at Mariners Green.



BALANCING THE BUDGET IN 2024/25



The ongoing financial pressures being faced by residents, businesses and individuals will remain at the forefront of the council's considerations as it plans its 2024/25 budget.

Councillor Jane Mudd, leader of the council, said: "The last few years have been challenging for all and the year ahead looks to be following a similar path. There were some difficult decisions to be made to balance the council budget for 2023/24, but our main aim was always to ensure

the most fundamental of services are maintained for residents and that we can support those that need an extra helping hand.

"That approach stays with us as we look to the coming year, but there is no doubt it will be a very difficult balancing act – the cost of providing services continues to rise in the same way that everyone's cost of living has gone up. And at the same time, more people are accessing those services, increasing demand. So, we will inevitably have a considerable gap between whatmoney we

have available to us and what we need and want to spend.

"The public's response to last year's budget proposals was excellent. We have promised to be a listening council and the constructive feedback really informed our final decisions. We were very pleased to be able to invest in some of the areas our residents felt were most important including schools and social care.

"Our initial proposals will be presented at Cabinet later this year and residents will again have the opportunity to scrutinise and share their opinions with us before any final decisions are made



WHERE THE COUNCIL **GETS ITS MONEY**

More than three-quarters of the council's budget is funded by a grant from the Welsh Government. Draft details of how much the council will receive for the coming financial year are expected to be received in December and will be confirmed in the new year.

The money raised through council tax only accounts for less than one quarter of the council's budget, but it is recognised that this is a very substantial bill for residents, despite Newport maintaining one of the lowest rates in Wales for many years.

VITAL SUPPORT HELPING NEWPORT FAMILIES



Our Families First prevention team provides a support service to families and children to improve the quality of their day-to-day lives.

Primarily for vulnerable children, aged from eight to 18, who may benefit from help and do not receive specialist support from other departments, such as social services.

By working with families to address their needs and build resilience, the team aims to improve outcomes and reduce the need for statutory intervention.

The team recognises that families have different needs, depending on their circumstances, and provide flexible packages of support.

Workers are located across the city and offer advice on parenting, challenging behaviour, school attendance, healthy relationships and much more.

NEWPORT CITY DOGS HOME WIN TWO RSPCA GOLD AWARDS

Newport City Dogs Home has won gold in two categories at the 2023 RSPCA Cymru PawPrint Awards for their work with stray dogs and kennelling.

This is the twelfth year that the team has been recognised with a gold award in the stray dog category for their dedication looking after the dogs in their care.

The RSPCA PawPrints annual award scheme recognises hard work from public bodies in relation to animal welfare.

There are a number of categories for awards including recognition for stray dog provision, animal licensing work, contingency planning, and housing policies.

To achieve a gold award for stray dog services requires protecting the welfare of stray dogs during and after they are in your care, as well as promoting responsible ownership. The kennelling gold



award requires ensuring the welfare needs of dogs are met and in line with RSPCA good practice.

Councillor James Clarke, cabinet member for strategic planning, regulation and housing said: "We are very proud of the hard work from everyone associated with Newport City Dogs Home. All of

our staff work very hard to ensure stray or unwanted dogs have the care they need to ensure bright futures in their new homes".

VOTER ID NOW LEGALLY REQUIRED AT SOME ELECTIONS

You may already have a form of photo ID that is acceptable as it could be a passport, driving licence, blue badge, certain concessionary travel cards, biometric immigration document or other types of identity cards.

You will only need to show one but it needs to be the original version and not a photocopy and the name on your ID must be the same you use to register to vote.

If you don't already have an accepted form of photo ID, or you're not sure whether your photo ID still looks like you, you can apply for a free voter ID document, known as a Voter Authority Certificate.

THREE-WEEKLY BIN COLLECTION ROLL-OUT



The council is rolling out its new three-weekly bin collection schedule to households across the city.

The new schedule will see household rubbish bins and garden waste bins collected once every three weeks. Currently these are collected once every two weeks.

Residents should already have received the following information through the post:

- a letter informing them that the changes are about to start
- a leaflet explaining what the changes mean and why they are being introduced

All households will continue to have their waste and recycling collected on the day of the week which it currently is. For example, if your collections are currently on a Monday, they will remain so.

All garden waste bins will continue to be collected fortnightly up until the end of November 2023, which is when these collections pause for the winter. They will move over to three-weekly once they resume in late February 2024. Note that garden waste collections for phase one households will remain three-weekly, as these have already moved onto the new schedule.

All other waste services will remain unchanged.

This means that recycling and food waste will continue to be collected weekly, and hygiene bags will be collected fortnightly.

Residents living in flats, or a house of multiple occupation will not have these changes made straight away. The council will work with landlords to introduce these changes at a later date.


The change has been brought in to help the council meet its recycling targets. Currently the council is recycling around 67 per cent of waste it collects. To meet Welsh government targets, this needs to increase to 70 per cent by 2024/25.

Failure to meet this target will see the council liable for fines. At the current recycling rate, the fine from April 2025 would be in excess of £500,000 per year.

Analysis of waste collected in Newport shows that almost 40 per cent of what is currently going into household rubbish bins can be recycled at the kerbside.

The council will make resources and assistance available for anyone who needs help with the changes.

CLIMATE CHANGE ANNUAL REPORT APPROVED BY COUNCIL

Our first full annual report for our organisational climate change plan was approved by the full council meeting in September.

The report, which covers the 2022/23 financial year, sets out the actions we took to help reduce our carbon emissions in line with our target of

becoming net zero by 2030.

The annual report contains a number of interesting case studies regarding our work, along with emissions data for each of our six themes.

The council declared a climate and ecological emergency in November 2021.

Our organisational climate change plan sets out how we will do our bit to fight climate change and become carbon neutral by 2030.

RESIDENTIAL DISABLED PARKING BAYS

Applications for disabled parking bays near people's homes have reopened.

Applications can be submitted to us from I November to 31 January.

All applications will be reviewed at the same time to ensure fairness and best use of the resources available.

Following a successful application, the work will be carried out within 12 to 18 months.

Although they are provided to help those with a disability park near their home, they can be used by anyone who displays a blue badge regardless of location.



USING TECHNOLOGY TO IMPROVE PEOPLE'S LIVES



The council has published its new digital strategy that defines the digital aspirations for the city over the next five years.



Based on four key themes - digital transformation, digital skills and inclusion, data and collaboration and digital infrastructure and connectivity - it will support and improve the wellbeing of residents and employees, as well as enabling businesses to thrive in the city.

The strategy sets out how the council will use technology to transform the delivery of its services. This represents an ambitious digital vision that embraces innovation delivered in partnership with the Shared Resource Service and other key partners.

The strategy is guided by important principles - innovation, data driven, user centred, inclusive, collaborative, secure and green. It also recognises the need for continued vigilance to protect the council's data from cyber-attacks and other threats.

Councillor Dimitri Batrouni, cabinet member for organisational transformation, said: "The last three years has seen some of the biggest changes in society and how people interact with public services through digital technology.

It has also highlighted inequalities in our communities regarding access to digital technology and the skills to use it effectively. The new digital strategy aims to address these issues and

support the delivery of our objectives set out in the corporate plan."

Elements of the strategy have already been progressed, including the implementation of the Local Broadband Fund project to transform the connectivity and systems in councilrun adult residential care homes and improvements to the council's website.

A new city centre hub which showcases the latest in assistive technology has also opened in Newport Market.

The hub is a place where people will be able speak to members of the council's occupational therapy team and get advice about using the latest in assistive technology – helping them to live independently and safely at home.

Further progress on the actions set out in the strategy will be reported in an annual digital report.

HELPING TO IMPROVE THE DIGITAL SKILLS **OF NEWPORT'S RESIDENTS**

The recently published digital strategy sets out how the council aims to improve the lives of residents in Newport by providing support and access to digital technology.

Newport adult community learning service offers computer courses for students at different levels - from beginners to intermediate and are for anyone aged 16 and over.

Digital skills courses can show you how to stay safe online, how to search and find information on the internet, how to be creative using your computer or laptop and how to use word processing and spreadsheet packages. All digital skills courses are free-ofcharge and can be joined at any time during the academic year.



If you're looking for courses to improve your job prospects the ICDL Level 1 and Level 2 courses are recommended and endorsed by employers. Both courses include word processing, spreadsheet and presentation modules.

There are two learning paths on offer – standard 24-week courses and fast-track courses, which are longer lessons over a 16-week period. Prices for ICDL courses start from £146 (£86 for concessions).
