**IN NEWPORT** 


The Tigers, one of the **British Army's leading parachute** display teams will be making a spectacular landing in Newport later this month\*.

Friday night will see the festival kick-off with a supper event at the Mercure Hotel, which will showcase fabulous Welsh, Georgian and German cuisine cooked up by our featured chefs.

Saturday will see the traditional food market set up in the city centre, with street entertainment, chef demonstrations in Newport Market, a vegan and vegetarian village in John Frost Square, and the return of the final of the Teen Chef competition.

Finally, on the Sunday there will be a new event for the festival, with live music and street food vendors taking over High Street.

**Creatives in Newport** and two other council areas are to benefit from funding which aims to nurture local talent.

Cardiff University's Centre for the Creative Economy is working in partnership with Newport, Monmouthshire and Rhondda Cynon Taf councils on a creative industries cluster project.

It is being funded by the Arts and Humanities Research Council and Department for Culture, Media and Sport.

# NEW BUSINESS GRANTS **SCHEME LAUNCHED**



**Newport City Council is** offering more financial assistance to local businesses thanks to funding from the **UK Government's shared** prosperity fund, part of its levelling up agenda.

For several years, the council has given grants to small and medium-sized businesses in the city to help with start-up and other costs and this is continuing.

However, the new accelerated growth grants programme will build on what has been a very successful scheme by offering grants of between £25,000 and £75,000 towards capital investment.

Councillor Jane Mudd, leader of Newport City Council, said: "Our ambitious vision for the city's growth and development has seen the city centre undergo one of the largest regeneration programmes in the UK.

"Projects delivered so far have delivered significant transformation and opportunities. Growing confidence in Newport has set the foundations for the city to capitalise on its economic potential.

"But this cannot be done by the council alone and we have adopted a collaborative approach with our enterprising local businesses. They are the lifeblood of our communities and our economy.

"We know the business sector has faced challenges in recent vears and so we want to continue to offer support whenever and however we can."

The accelerated growth programme is aimed at wellestablished or new companies to set up premises or for existing city businesses to accelerate their plans for growth.

The grants will be offered as match funding for equipment that is essential for the establishment of a new business or enables the business to grow substantially.




#### **BOOKINGS NOW AVAILABLE FOR CITY CENTRE SMART HUB**

## FREE SCHOOL MEALS FOR ALL PRIMARY SCHOOL PUPILS



From this month, pupils in all council-maintained primary schools in the city will be eligible for a free school meal.

Financial support is also available for parents of primary and secondary pupils towards other costs such as uniform.

The council has rolled out the universal free school meal offer ahead of the Welsh Government target date in 2024.

It had asked councils to extend the scheme to years three and four from September but pupils in years five and six are also included in Newport.

Universal free school meals were first made available last year to younger learners and Newport again delivered ahead of the deadline by offering them to years one and two as well as reception pupils last September.

Councillor Jane Mudd, leader of the council, said: "We made a promise to help as many children and their families as possible, as quickly as possible, and we have kept that promise."

Councillor Deb Davies, cabinet member for education and early years, added: "I would encourage parents and carers to check whether they are also entitled to other support with school costs by visiting our website or contacting the council."

Pupils will be able to access meals directly through their school at the start of term.

You do not have to apply to receive a free school meal but families do have to apply to access additional financial support. It is important to do that so you don't miss out on this extra help.

## **NEW 20MPH DEFAULT SPEED LIMITS IN PLACE**

The new 20mph default speed limit in Wales is now in place.

The 20mph limit came into effect on Sunday 17 September, making Wales the first nation in the UK to adopt 20mph as a default speed limit.

The default speed limit applies to streets with streetlights no more than 200 yards apart, usually located in residential and built-up areas.

These streets will not have 20mph signs up, as that is now the default speed limit. From now, any speed limit signs in place will be to indicate a higher speed limit than 20mph.

There are some streets that will remain at 30mph. These are known as exceptions, and maps showing each of the 30mph exceptions are available to view on the council website.

You can also find maps showing which streets have defaulted to 20mph on our website.

Welsh government has advised that reducing the speed limit from 30mph to 20mph on restricted roads could see many benefits.

These include:

- Helping to improve our health and wellbeing
- Making our streets safer
- Safeguarding the environment for future generations
- **Reducing road collisions**
- **More opportunities** to walk and cycle in our communities

Responsibility for enforcing speed limits lies with the police.





#### REMINDER **ABOUT CHANGES TO WASTE COLLECTIONS**

The first phase of our three-weekly waste collections has been running since June, and we'd like to extend our thanks to all residents whose households have been part of the initial rollout by keeping recyclable waste out of their bins.

Before the changes take place where you live, we'll deliver a letter confirming the date from when we'll make these changes, and a calendar showing your new collection dates for these services.



We'll continue to collect your:

food waste and 'dry recycling' every week, and

nappy and hygiene waste every two weeks if you're registered for this service.

Did you know that nearly half of all waste disposed of in household rubbish bins across the city can be recycled?

Research carried out last year by Welsh Government showed that 47 per cent of waste found in black bins could actually be recycled.

47% of what goes into our black bins in Newport actually could be recycled!

**Around 24 per cent** of black bin waste was food, which can be recycled into your brown food caddy.

Another 14 per cent of black bin waste could be recycled using your recycling bags and boxes.

A further 2 per cent of black bin waste can be recycled using the garden waste bins, while around 7 per cent can be recycled at the household waste recycling centre.

# **GREEN FLAGS RAISED ONCE** MORE IN NEWPORT PARKS



Two of Newport's biggest parks are celebrating once again after retaining their Green Flag status for 2023/24.

Beechwood Park and Belle Vue Park have been recognised by Keep Wales Tidy for their excellent visitor facilities, high environmental standards, and commitment to delivering great quality green space.

This will be the seventeenth consecutive year that Belle Vue has been awarded Green Flag status, while Beechwood is celebrating its sixth consecutive award.

Belle Vue has also retained its Green Heritage status for a sixth-year running.

A third council managed site, Gwent Crematorium, has also retained its Green Flag status for the seventh year in a row.

Four community-run sites in the city, Bishton village pond community area, Lliswerry pond, Glade community garden and the Laundry gardens, have also been recognised with Green Flag status.


The Green Flag awards are a UKwide scheme which recognise and reward well-managed parks and green spaces.

The Green Flag award programme is delivered in Wales by Keep Wales Tidy, with support from Welsh Government.

Independent green space experts volunteered their time to judge applicant sites against eight strict criteria, including biodiversity, cleanliness, environmental management, and community involvement.

Councillor Yvonne Forsey, cabinet member for climate change and biodiversity, said: "I'm delighted that our three sites have retained their Green Flag status.

"Increasing and improving our green infrastructure is one of the key priorities from our organisational climate change plan. Along with our successful application for Tree City of the World status, these awards recognise our officers' hard work and dedication in managing our green spaces for the benefit of residents, visitors and nature."

#### **IMPROVEMENTS TO MONMOUTHSHIRE** AND BRECON CANAL

**Newport City Council is** working on a series of improvements to the Monmouthshire and Brecon Canal.

The improvements will see the council clear silt and vegetation in the canal from the Fourteen Locks site up to the city boundary with Caerphilly county.

This stretch will also be relined.

The desilting and relining will improve water flow and retention, as well as improving the water environment for biodiversity purposes.

The Fourteen Locks site will also benefit from a new bridge over the pond, and new lock gates above the pond to replace the existing ones. The bridge will provide improved accessibility to the Fourteen Locks visitor centre with a modified access ramp. Feasibility works will also start on a potential redesign of the visitor centre.

Councillor Yvonne Forsey, cabinet member for climate change and biodiversity, said: "Building resilience in our city's ecosystem is one of the priorities in our organisational climate change plan, and the desilting and relining work that will be carried out will help to build that resilience in the canal for future generations.

"The canal is an important site within the local community, so I'm also pleased that these improvements will widen access to the visitor centre."

The work has been funded through the UK Government's Shared Prosperity Fund under the Communities and Place investment priority.

Residents should expect varying levels of disruption over the next 18 months while these works are carried out. This will include full or partial closures of the canal path, for which diversions will be put in place, and may limit parking in the car park.

Exact timings for this work will be communicated through council channels and on site at Fourteen Locks once they are confirmed.



### **PUTTING CHILDREN, NOT PROFIT,** AT THE HEART OF FOSTERING



Foster Wales Newport is highlighting the benefits of fostering with a local authority as Welsh Government moves ahead with plans to remove profit from the care of looked-after children.

Wales is in the process of a whole system change for children's services and there is a clear commitment to "eliminate private profit from the care of looked after children".

This means that by 2027, care of children that are looked after in Wales will be provided by public sector, charitable or not-for-profit organisations.

In light of these changes, Foster Wales Newport – which is part of the network representing the 22 local authorities in Wales - is calling for more people to become local authority foster carers and encouraging those currently

fostering with a for-profit agency to transfer over to us.

Councillor Stephen Marshall, Newport City Council's cabinet member for social services, said: "This is a positive step forward and will hugely change the care of young people in Wales.

"Fostering with your local authority offers many benefits from including a network of support and training. Importantly, it also means that children and young people who are being fostered can stay close to their families, friends and communities.

"We would love to hear from local people who want to make a difference to the lives of local children and can help us make this change happen. Get in touch with our friendly team today.

"Foster carers do amazing work, opening their doors and their hearts to provide children with care and support. All of us in the local

authority very much appreciate their dedication and commitment."

In Wales, 79 per cent of children cared for by private fostering agencies are fostered outside their local area, and six per cent are moved out of Wales entirely. Meanwhile, 84 per cent of those living with local authority foster carers stay within their own local area, close to home, to school, to family and friends.

### WHEN TO APPLY FOR A SCHOOL **PLACE FOR 2024**

School admission timetables are published the summer of the year before a child is due to start school and it is important that parents make note of the application deadlines and apply within the relevant timeframe.

The next round of applications will open on 25 September 2023 for secondary school places, with a closing date of 13 November 2023.

Applications for 2024 reception places will open on 6 November 2023 and will close on 9 January 2024.

Parents/carers can choose any school they want their child to attend and the council will try to meet that preference where

places are available. However, in many areas of Newport, the demand for school places is particularly high and there are often more applications received than there are places available.

It is important that parents/ carers read the individual school admissions policy and express a preference for at least three different schools.

By choosing more than one school it will increase the chance of getting a place that they are happy with. A preference for the catchment school will receive priority but this does not guarantee a place.

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### **PRAISE FOR NEWPORT SCHOOLS**



In July, three schools received glowing reports from the official inspection body Estyn.

Inspectors found Pentrepoeth Primary School was a place "where pupils thrive and enjoy a wide range of engaging and exciting learning experiences".

It was also lauded by the Welsh Network of Healthy Schools who said: "Wow, what a school! There can be no doubt that Pentrepoeth Primary School is a healthy school and fully deserving of its National Quality Award."

St Mary's RC Primary was found to be "a diverse, inclusive school where everyone matters."

The report added: "Adults care deeply about the pupils, each other and the wider school community. As a result, there is a strong ethos

#### **GET HELP WITH CHILDCARE COSTS**

Did you know that parents and carers who are working, or in education, could be eligible for support towards the costs of childcare?

Through the Childcare Offer for Wales, you could claim up to 30 hours of early education and childcare a week, for up to 48 weeks a year.

And the tax-free childcare scheme is for working families, including the self-employed, who aren't receiving tax credits or

universal credit with children aged 0-11 (or 0-16 if disabled).
